PATIENT NOTICE: Your Opioid Medication

Information About Tennessee Law Limiting Opioid Medication



Most prescriptions for an opioid medication will be limited to a 3-day supply

Tennessee law now requires prescribers to follow strict guidelines before initiating opioid medication. This will affect commonly prescribed drugs such as:

- Hydrocodone
 Oxycodone
- Percocet
- Tramadol
- Lortab

- Vicodin
 Codeine
 - Cough Syrups containing opioids

With some exceptions,* the initial supply of opioid medication is limited to 3-days.

Your prescriber must take all of the following additional actions before prescribing you 4 or more days of opioid medication.

AN OPIOID PRESCRIPTION OF 4 DAYS OR MORE REQUIRES THE FOLLOWING STEPS:

- Your prescriber must personally conduct a thorough evaluation. 1.
- Your prescriber or a staff member must check the state's Controlled Substance 2. Monitoring Database.
- Your prescriber must discuss opioid risks and warnings with you and consider using 3. alternative, non-opioid pain management medications and/or treatments.
- Your prescriber must inform you about the responsible use of opioids. 4.
- Your prescriber will ask you to sign a form giving consent to opioid treatment and 5. acknowledging that you understand the risks and benefits of opioid treatment and alternatives to opioid treatment.

If you are prescribed up to a 10, 20 or 30-day prescription of opioids, your pharmacist can only fill half of your initial prescription per state law. You or someone on your behalf will be required to make a second visit to fill the remaining prescription, if needed.

*EXCEPTIONS: Patients being treated for chronic pain, severe burns, major physical trauma and certain chronic conditions.
